FIRST NATIONS FIRST

"I was not taught the history of widespread and systematic massacres of Aboriginal peoples or the frontier wars when I attended primary, high school or university. When I became aware of massacres on Noongar Boodjar I was saddened, angry and confused, and it is hard not having these events recognised publicly in the same way we remember many other war engagements as a nation.

This difficult fact is always going to elicit disbelief, anger, deep sorrow and loss. Every year, in the centre of Boorloo (Perth) and across WA, from Kwinana to Karijini, we are privileged to share music on Country with exceptional First Nations artists and Elders.

WASO has made an organisation-wide commitment to advance reconciliation with our inaugural 'Reflect' Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) endorsed by Reconciliation Australia. While we have for decades worked in collaboration with local Noongar and First Nations artists to present music and stories on the mainstage, the RAP program allows us to connect more deeply; engaging

our workplace structure and harnessing the power of individuals working together to create an impact bigger than any one story or concert.

Increasing our understanding of cultures and histories, stories and songs is fundamental to building respectful relationships with those in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. It is through these relationships based on listening, learning and collaborating that we can offer music that truly reflects our shared history and promotes healing.

EVERYONE DESERVES THE JOY OF LIVE MUSIC

Music is universal, and WASO is committed to providing everyone the opportunity to relish the joy that it brings.

In hospitals and aged care, bespoke performances and programs bring the healing power of music across Western Australia to those who may not be able to access a live orchestral performance in a concert hall setting.

Our Hospital Orchestra Project (HOP) sees WASO work with the School of Special Education Needs: Medical and Mental Health (SSEN:MMH) at Perth Children's Hospital to enable children and adolescents in hospital to benefit from the power of music. Our musicians present a range of performances and participatory music events, visit classrooms and wards, and inspire patients with emotionally supportive experiences and sounds.

WASO's Connect program brings equally tailored programming to Perth Concert Hall, engaging adults living with disabilities through chamber concerts and bespoke rehearsal viewings. These unique experiences for people living with a disability and their carers also include opportunities to meet the WASO musicians, creating memories and bringing joy in an intimate and considered setting.

On the road, WASO delivers small ensemble performances to nursing homes and aged care settings as part of Music For The Ages. In between sharing stories about life working in an orchestra, the musicians discuss the music and perform excerpts creating curated experiences that for many listeners, transport them back to moments of their youth, times of joy with family and friends, or spark memories that may be faded by age.

"My grandad passed away in May of this year and my grandma has dementia and is unable to form short term memories. The morning after the performance and celebrations, my mum went to visit her. She does not recall the morning tea or the family being there but she said to my mum "I think I saw music yesterday, it was beautiful. Fred would have loved it."

"This is the first short term memory she has created in quite some time! Over the days that followed she also got her photo albums out with mum and looked over the travels that she and Grandad shared. There were lots of tears, both happy and sad, but I think she actually grieved, something she had not really done either because of the dementia or because she was not ready (we will never know). In any case, the music broke through her dementia and reached her."

Across outer metropolitan Perth and around the state, WASO Community Ensembles perform to over 5,000 people annually, bringing orchestral music to the regions, the city and everywhere in between, fostering a sense of connectedness to community through music.

Giving people an opportunity to participate in music-making is another way WASO brings people together through live performance.

The Rusty Orchestra provides an annual opportunity for community musicians from all over Western Australia to sit alongside WASO musicians on the mainstage for a performance of classical repertoire. This community side-by-side celebrates 10 years in 2023, continuing to provide music-lovers and players with WASO mentoring and performance experience. Previous participants have joined the program from as far as Albany and Geraldton, truly connecting WA's music community.

CRESCENDO: MUSIC EDUCATION CASE STUDY

Play-based learning programs for young children, such as WASO's flagship music education program, Crescendo, provide a strong basis for future success at school. Students engaging with and playing music have improved school attendance, accelerated learning, and more confidence to face challenges and create solutions.

Since its pilot in 2014, participating students in the Crescendo program have demonstrated they are generally happier young people who are more connected with their community. And, happier young people grow up to be more resilient adults with brighter futures.

"The Crescendo program engages all students. The use of voice initially, immediately captures the child's innate desire to express themselves, whilst the use of melody, rhythm, story-telling using rhymes and books, movement activities and the use of musical instruments ensures all students will be engaged with the program. The development of the students' creative capacities through a structured and highly organised learning experience is extremely beneficial to the development of the whole child and it complements academic and creative programs in operation within the school.

The program has value on its own merits as a highly motivational and valuable learning experience, but further to this, there is considerable evidence that programs such as Crescendo demonstrate a high level of transference of skills to learning areas such as Literacy, Numeracy and social development, which are our core responsibilities in a primary school setting. The learning experiences involve the students in narrative exercises, memory development, word and sound recognition, meaningful repetition, scales and independent and team-oriented activities. These experiences are highly relevant to the core learning areas of the school curriculum. Studies completed by Doctor Anita Collins, a noted academic in the area of neuro-musical education, confirm the empirical and anecdotal evidence regarding the power of music to enhance learning." - Peter Elsegood, Principal, North Parmelia Primary School

THE MUSIC STARTS HERE

All young West Australians should have the opportunity to engage with cultural life in the town that they live. With these opportunities they can reach their full potential; become more resilient, and better connect with their community and our national identity.

Over the last decade, West Australian Symphony
Orchestra has built and nurtured one of the most
significant education programs of any Australian orchestra
alongside our year-round mainstage program. The work
that we do on the mainstage, with Crescendo in Kwinana
and across our community, changes lives.

Our connections with schools and students open up opportunities for the State Orchestra to enrich the West Australian music curriculum from Kindergarten to Year 12.

We support teachers with the music syllabus through our in-school Education Chamber Orchestra visits, free WASO in Schools ensembles and bring the classroom to the concert hall for our mainstage concerts, while providing detailed education resources to enliven the learning process.

Education Support Centres and Education Support Schools are also invited to bring the joy of live music into the comfort of their school environment, as WASO tailors our presentations for students living with a disability. Here, our Harmony Music program enables small ensembles to perform informal classroom concerts and introduce students to the instruments of the orchestra with popular music. The concert is often accompanied by a book reading, with the whole experience allowing both students and carers respite through arts curriculum learning.

"The performance was just wonderful. It was at their level, interactive, and gave them the opportunity to experience live orchestral music. Just wonderful in every way." – Education Support Staff member

These initiatives make music more accessible for schools across WA and broadens each students' musical experiences.

As students begin their journey to tertiary study we enhance both general and ATAR music education in Years 11 and 12, delivering concerts and workshops to provide real value and relevance for their study.

Supporting teachers through music education is key and introducing students to music education unlocks the spark; as we connect and engage with students across the state, on stage and online.

CELEBRATING THE CREATORS OF CULTURE

While delivering world-class performances, WASO works to develop and empower the next generation of musicians, conductors and composers. Assisting them in finding their professional pathways in Australia and beyond, we are striving to secure a bright future for music.

Industry-leading partnerships with the Australian National Academy of Music (ANAM), the Western Australian Youth Orchestra (WAYO) and UWA Conservatorium of Music enable WASO to mentor young talent across the country through in-depth development programs and side-by-side performances on the mainstage.

On the podium throughout each year, WASO's Emerging Conductors program, Assistant Conductor position and participation in the Australian Conducting Academy see aspiring conductors learn from experienced orchestral leaders, whilst working with WASO and the other major Australian orchestras.

2017 Assistant Conductor, Elena Schwarz, exemplifies the quality of graduates WASO has seen from our conducting programs, going on to a role as Associate Conductor of the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra and securing a position as Dudamel Fellow with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra for their 2018-19 season.

Composition Project nurtures emerging West Australian composers, providing them with the opportunity to develop their skills in a professional environment through lessons, workshops and rehearsals. Participants compose works for a chamber ensemble, cumulating in world premiere performances on the Perth Concert Hall stage.

Graduates from the program have gone on to gain placements in national and international composition programs and attain professional commissions and residencies, with 2022 Composition Project winner Victor Arul securing one of only two places annually to study a PhD in composition at Harvard University.

WASO's Composer in Residence provides a local composer with long-term support to create new works for both small ensembles and full symphony orchestra. Previous Composers in Residence include James Ledger, now lecturer in composition at UWA's Conservatorium of Music, and Iain Grandage, now Artistic Director of Perth Festival, amongst others. Olivia Davies commenced as Composer in Residence in 2022 for a three year term, having already composed two works for the mainstage. Davies' first work for WASO, *Stratus* was awarded Large Ensemble Work of the Year at the 2022 Art Music Awards.


