

In January, WASO musicians and staff were delighted to welcome new Chief Executive Officer, Mark Coughlan to the team. Mark is a very familiar face to many, having been on the WASO Board since 2009. Following the announcement of Craig Whitehead's resignation in July last year after ten years in the role, the WASO Board conducted an extensive international search and appointed Mark Coughlan in December 2018.

On the appointment, WASO Chairman Richard Goyder AO said "We are delighted that Mark has accepted the role of CEO. He has made a significant contribution to the music community of Western Australia over many years and provided valuable guidance to WASO over the last decade as a member of our Board. Following an extensive search, we are confident that Mark is best placed to continue to build WASO's international reputation for artistic excellence and community engagement."

Mark is recognised nationally as a cultural leader, having served as a member of the Board of Directors of Musica Viva Australia and as Federal Chairman of the Australian Music Examinations Board (AMEB), Australia's largest music examination and publishing company. Mark is widely known as a passionate advocate for the Western Australian classical music scene. He established the Government House Ballroom concert series in 2006 and held the position of Head of School of Music at the University of Western Australia from 1995 to 2003.

In his capacity as a WASO Board director, Mark has also been a great supporter of our Patrons & Friends community over the years - he even went so far as to kindly host one of our Patrons events at his beautiful home last February.

Mark is thrilled and honoured to be undertaking the role:

"I have loved and admired the West Australian Symphony Orchestra all of my life. From a young age, WASO provided my window into the remarkable world of music, as it does for so many West Australians. International Artist Masterclass with Gautier Capuçon

It is easy to imagine how nervous you might be performing in front of a world-renowned artist. Those nerves were quickly dispelled, however by the bright nature of French cellist Gautier Capuçon during the final 2018 International Artist Masterclass held on Thursday 11th October. Hosted by Executive Manager, Community Engagement, Cassandra Lake, the Masterclass saw Capuçon guide three young WA cellists towards beautiful performances.

What is less likely to imagine is how we have developed so much young talent in Western Australia – there was quite an impressive display on the night! The first performer, Sophie Butler from Methodist Ladies' College, currently studying with WASO Associate Principal Cello,

Louise McKay, played Schumann's Fantasy Pieces Op.73 accompanied by Georgina Adamson. Capuçon broke the ice by asking if she was breathing and jovially encouraging her to relax and let her body language show she was enjoying the piece. This advice was well received by Sophie with a more relaxed playing style.

Miah Smith of UWA, who is in her second year of study with Assoc. Professor Suzanne Wijsman, then played the first movement of Lalo's Concerto in D Minor accompanied by Martina Liegat Wilson. This is quite a dramatic piece of music and again to relax Miah whilst comically demonstrating, Capuçon said he thought she was too nice and needed to show some anger. He also spent some time with Miah on the technique of holding the bow, encouraging her to hold it firmly but not too rigidly, so that it may move more fluidly.

The surprise of the night came with Max Wung from the International School of Western Australia who studies with WASO Principal Cello Rod McGrath. At only 13 years of age Max gave a very mature presentation in all respects of Tchaikovsky's Variations on a Rococo Theme (V. 4-7), accompanied by Gaby Gunders. Capuçon made some minor suggestions including relaxing the shoulders and expressing the mood of the music facially, as well as encouraging Max to use the lower part of the strings for bowing to produce a richer and stronger note when required.

With that, another year of successful WASO International Artist Masterclasses was over and as always, they played a very important role in the life of classical music in Perth.



Orchestral partnerships – Thank you for the wonderful relationships!



Supporting our musicians lies at the very heart of philanthropy at WASO and is vital to how we can operate. Government funding no longer fully covers orchestral salaries and income through ticket sales is, whilst substantial, not enough to cover our expenditure. It is therefore critically important to find new ways to fill this salary gap and our Orchestral Partnerships Fund enables us to rely on a stable source of funding for paying our musicians.

An Orchestral Partnership funds a Chair in the Orchestra and enables Patrons to deepen their connection with the Orchestra and their knowledge of a particular instrument. Patrons get to watch the musical career of the musician of their choice and enjoy musical and social occasions with WASO's players while learning more about the life of a professional musician.

Orchestral Partnerships can be arranged either individually or as part of a syndicate and have a minimum commitment of two years. Partners will be acknowledged beneath 'their' player's name in WASO concert programs and on the website and also as part of our regular Patrons acknowledgements. These partnerships can last for many years and can be deeply gratifying experiences for both Patrons and musicians.

Below is a snapshot of just some of WASO's incredible Education & Community Engagement initiatives, some of which will be covered as part of the briefing



Our **Harmony Music Program** visits students with Special Educational Needs, providing young people, their teachers and their carers with the opportunity to interact with musicians and enjoy a performance in the comfort of their school environment. This program sees small WASO ensembles perform informal classroom presentations, share stories about life as a professional musician and introduce students to the instruments of the orchestra through performances and interactive sessions.

Harmony Music is supported by Mitsubishi Corporation.



Our Hospital Orchestra Project (HOP) brings moments of joy to the lives of unwell children and their families at Perth Children's Hospital. WASO musicians present a broad range of performances and participatory programs for children, as well as visit children on the wards six times a year.

Our Hospital Orchestra Project has been running since 2008 in partnership with the School of Special Educational Needs: Medical and Mental Health with support from Starlight Foundation, who broadcast all performances on Starlight TV, helping us reach children who are unable to join us in the hospital theatre.



Our new program **Music for the Ages** has been designed to reach individuals who are unable to attend a symphony orchestra concert or rehearsal. It provides engaging chamber ensemble performances across the Aged Care and Healthcare sectors and encourages a lifelong journey with WASO's music and musicians. We have had a terrific response to this initiative and hope to spread the joy of live music even further this coming year.

For the Eternal Love of Music - In Memoriam Anna Nottage



WASO recently lost a much-loved member of our Patron community in Anna (Tosi) Nottage, an avid follower of the Orchestra. Born in Perth on the 3rd of November, 1916 as an only child to Danish parents, Anna or Tosi for those who were closest to her – lived to the incredible age of 101 before peacefully passing away on the 4th of April last year. Anna and her late husband Edgar, who used to lead the Perth Male Voices Choir for over 40 years, were long-time subscribers of the Orchestra.

Besides Anna's life-long love of animals (she briefly studied veterinary science at Liverpool University in the UK and also ran a boarding kennel for dogs during the war), Anna always had a keen interest in

education and ended up teaching generations of students in French, Algebra, History, Geography and Violin at MLC, St Hilda's, Girdlestone High School in central Perth and finally in East Perth. The latter was also where she crossed paths with Edgar for a second time - initially, some 20 years previously, they were introduced by a mutual friend and Edgar became her accompanist - she on violin, he on piano. This time, when Edgar became Superintendent of Music for the Department of Education, Anna was invited to join 'Music Branch' where Edgar worked and they would eventually run a youth orchestra together on Friday evenings.

Born in the middle of World War I, Anna lived through the Great Depression and had World War II declared on her 23rd birthday. From early on Anna was forced to be fiercely independent and eventually even wrote her own autobiography titled Foundations for Self-Reliance. During her teaching years, she also became actively involved in and then President of an organisation called Quota, an international professional women's service club designed to support women and girls in need.

It was orchestral music, though that turned into her biggest love of all and Anna eventually became a member of the ABC Orchestra, a predecessor to what today is WASO. Later in life, Anna, a 20-year plus WASO subscriber, decided to crown her love for the Orchestra with a substantial bequest to ensure that 'her' Orchestra carried on for future generations of Western Australians.

In 1997, when Anna was 81 years old, Anna and Edgar got married and enjoyed years of travelling the four corners of the earth until Edgar sadly passed away in 2008. Whilst Anna left no direct family, she was a significant part of the lives of her friends, Lois and Mike Woodcock, for over 60 years, and they have told us about her eternal love of music and commitment to support future generations of musicians.

For those of you who knew Anna and have always wondered – the nickname 'Tosi' was given to her by her Danish parents when she was very small, meaning 'small one' or 'the kid', and it just stayed with her for the rest of her very long life! At just over five foot tall, Anna was a bundle of energy and resilience, and we are indebted to her commitment to what she believed in. From all of us at the Orchestra, thank you Tosi.
